INTRODUCTION

This is the University's policy relating to the calculation and payment of tuition fees for both commencing and continuing international students in 2010.

An international student:

- is not an Australian citizen or permanent resident; and
- does not hold a permanent Australian humanitarian visa; and
- is not a New Zealand citizen.

If you are an Australian or New Zealand citizen, an Australian permanent resident or if you hold a permanent Australian humanitarian visa, you should refer to the separate publication, *Australian Student Tuition Fees 2010*.

It is important that you read this policy before completing your administrative enrolment. Once you enrol, you will be bound by this fee policy and are agreeing to pay tuition fees for every year in which you are enrolled.

This policy applies to international students:

- enrolled in a study abroad, undergraduate, graduate coursework or graduate research course (including Masters by Research, Doctoral and PhD candidates);
- enrolled in Community Access Program subjects;
- studying 'on shore' or 'off shore'.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What fees do I pay?

UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS

In 2010 you pay tuition fees based on the particular subjects you choose to study. The amount you are charged is the sum of the fees for all subjects in which you enrol.

Subject fees are set within a fixed number of fee bands based on the Australian Government Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations discipline classification of the subject, with different prices charged for undergraduate subjects, graduate subjects and Community Access Program study.

For details of the 2010 subject discipline fee bands and how to calculate your tuition fees see pages 3-6. For a schedule of typical 2010 undergraduate course tuition fees see page 7.

GRADUATE STUDENTS

Students commencing a graduate course in 2010 will pay a course based tuition fee (except for courses offered by the Office of Environmental Programs). Continuing students who commenced their graduate course prior to 2010 will continue to pay subject based tuition fees.

Graduate course based fees (commenced course in 2010)

The amount you pay is listed on pages 8-12. This amount is the fee for all students commencing in the course in 2010. The fee listed is per EFTSL; if you are studying more or less than one EFTSL in 2010 your fee will increase or decrease proportionally.

Graduate subject fees (commenced current course prior to 2010)

The amount you are charged in 2010 is the sum of the fees for all subjects in which you enrol.

Subject fees are set within a fixed number of fee bands based on the Australian Government Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations discipline classification of the subject, with different prices charged for undergraduate subjects, graduate subjects and Community Access Program study.

Other fees

STUDENT SERVICES AND AMENITIES FEE

The Commonwealth Government is likely to introduce a Student Services and Amenities Fee from 2010. Details of the fee will be provided after legislation has been passed and full details are known.

OVERSEAS STUDENT HEALTH COVER (OSHC)

It is compulsory for international students to take out Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) while studying in Australia. OSHC Worldcare is the University's preferred OSHC provider. Details of costs can be obtained from their web site: www.oshcworldcare.com.au/

What is an EFTSL?

An EFTSL (equivalent full time student load) is a measure of study load. One EFTSL is equivalent to 100 credit points and represents a standard annual full time load.

If my tuition fees are paid on a subject basis, how do I know which discipline band applies to my subject?

Every subject at the University has been assigned to a discipline fee band. Details can be found in the Subject Fee Calculator at <http://fee.acs.unimelb.edu.au/>

Will my tuition fees ever differ from the published fee?

The subject and course fees detailed in this publication relate to 2010 only.

These fees are subject to annual review and may be adjusted to take into account price and demand factors. The University provides a guarantee to international students that the fee will not increase by more than 7 per cent per annum in any discipline for undergraduate subjects and not by more than 10 per cent per annum in any discipline for graduate subjects (this is not applicable to Community Access Program subject fees). For students enrolled in a graduate course and paying a course based fee, the University provides a guarantee that the course fee will not increase by more than 10 per cent per annum.

When do I pay?

Tuition fee payments are made in advance. In 2010, you have three payment options: standard instalment; dual instalment or yearly instalment. Refer to the Payment Options section on page 13 for more information.

You will be sent an invoice for each fee instalment. It is your responsibility to pay your fees and complete your enrolment by the published date; otherwise a late fee will be levied. If your fees remain unpaid, your enrolment will be cancelled and you will then need to reapply for admission to the course. You will remain liable for any outstanding debt. The University is required to advise the Department of Immigration and Citizenship of any cancellation of enrolment. This may lead to the cancellation of your student visa.

What is a census date?

The census date for a subject is the last date that you can withdraw from that subject without incurring fee liability.

What happens if I change subjects?

COURSE FEE

Your course fee will only change if you change your study load (EFTSL). If you increase the number of subjects in which you are enrolled or change to subjects of a higher weighting your fee liability will increase. If you reduce the number of subjects in which you are enrolled or change to subjects of a lower weighting you may decrease your fee liability and may be eligible for a refund however you must have withdrawn from subject(s) by the subject census date or you will be charged for the original study load.

SUBJECT FEES

Changing to subjects in different fee bands or changes to study load will result in a change to your fee liability (refer to Variation to Fees Owing section on page 14).

If the subject you add to your enrolment is charged at a higher rate than the one from which you withdraw, additional tuition fees will be payable. Alternatively if the subject you add to your enrolment is charged at a lower rate than the one from which you withdraw your subsequent semester's tuition fee will be credited or you may apply for a refund (refer to Refunds section on page 14).

If you withdraw from a subject you must do so by the census date for that subject or you will be charged for the subject (refer to Variation to Fees Owing section on page 14).

What if I transfer to a new course?

If you transfer to a new graduate course, the fees you pay will be those set for the new course into which you enrol.

For undergraduate students transferring to a new course, the fees you pay will be those set for the subjects into which you enrol at the time of transfer.

What if I defer my studies?

If you have an offer to study at the University in 2010 and you defer your studies until 2011, the fees you pay on commencement will be those set for 2011.

What if I have a query about my fees?

2010 SUBJECT FEES

Except for international students beginning a graduate course in 2010, students enrolling at the University of Melbourne in 2010 in an international fee place will pay tuition fees based on the particular subjects they choose to study.

Undergraduate and graduate program subjects have been grouped into fee bands, based on the cost of teaching the subjects and the demand for the discipline in which they fall. The amount you are charged is the sum of the fees for all subjects in which you enrol.

The discipline fee bands that have been set for international students in 2010 are detailed in Tables 1–2. The discipline fee band tables below set out the basis for calculating your fees but do not necessarily represent a typical enrolment. These discipline fee bands are determined by the content of the subject, not the course of which it forms a part, nor the faculty or school which is responsible for teaching it.

If you would like an estimate of what your course tuition fees will be in 2010 refer to page 7 for a schedule of typical course tuition fees for each undergraduate course.

As far as possible the fees provided in this schedule show the typical fees that a student enrolled in each course will pay for the first year of the course in 2010. However, these are indicative only and may vary depending on the subject level and discipline fee band of your enrolment.

For most courses the typical tuition fees are based on historical enrolments in the course, reflecting the discipline band of the subjects comprising the degree. For the new generation degrees a typical fee range is shown, due to the wide range of variables that may affect the course structure.

CALCULATING YOUR TUITION FEE

Undergraduate

The fees shown in Tables 1 and 2 are for each 100 credit points (1 EFTSL) that you undertake. 100 credit points is a standard full-time load for one year of study. Fees are charged based on the EFTSL value of the subject in each semester. For example if a subject is worth 12.5 credit points (0.125 EFTSL) then the fee charged is 0.125 multiplied by the \$/EFTSL fee.

All year-long subjects are required to have their fees paid in full in semester 1. For example, if a year-long subject is worth 37.5 credit points (0.375 EFTSL) then the fee is charged as 0.375 multiplied by the \$/EFTSL fee in semester 1.

The total fees you will pay in any year are the sum of the subject fees for all subjects in which you are enrolled.

Example

Chen is an international student who enrolls in a Bachelor of Science in 2010. She enrolls in a total of 100 credit points (1 EFTSL), comprising 8 subjects:

- 4 science subjects (12.5 credit points each);
- 2 commerce subjects (12.5 credit points each); and
- 2 maths subjects (12.5 credit points each)

Chen's tuition fees for 2010 are calculated as:
 $(4 \times 0.125 \times \$30,000) + (2 \times 0.125 \times \$29,700) + (2 \times 0.125 \times \$28,250) = \$29,487.50$

Graduate coursework

The fees shown on pages 8-12 are for 100 credit points (1 EFTSL). Each subject that you undertake has an EFTSL, or credit point value; 100 credit points is a standard full-time load for one year of study. For example, if you undertake 8 subjects worth 12.5 credit points each (0.125 EFTSL) then your total study load for the year is 1 EFTSL and you will pay the amount listed. If you undertake more or less than 1 EFTSL in a year the amount charged will increase or decrease correspondingly.

Example

Frankie is an international student who enrolls in a Graduate Certificate in Wine Technology and Viticulture in 2010. He enrolls in a total of 50 credit points (0.5EFTSL) in Semester 1 and completes his degree.

Frankie's tuition fees for 2010 are calculated as:
 $\$28,500 \times 0.5 = \$14,250$

Graduate research

Fees are based on the workload (EFTSL) you undertake in each semester. Research semesters differ from coursework semesters in that semester 1 is defined as 1 January to 30 June (six months) and semester 2 is defined as 1 July to 31 December (six months).

You will be charged on a daily pro rata basis.

Adjustments for commencing research students

If you enrol after a semester commencement date, your first semester fees will be adjusted to take account of the number of days you will actually be enrolled.

Example

Eunice is an international student who enrolls in a Master of Education (by Research). She starts her degree on 1 January with a workload of 0.5 EFTSL. Eunice's Semester 1 tuition fee is calculated as:

$$\$21,400 \times 0.5 = \$10,700$$

However if Eunice did not commence until 20 March, her tuition fees would be adjusted to take account of the fact that her first semester will be of only 103 days duration. This means she will only be charged from 20 March, thus her tuition fee will be calculated as:

$$\$21,400 \times 0.5 \times 103/181 = \$6,089$$

Tuition fees for students commencing in semester two

If you are commencing your course in semester 2, 2010, your fees for your first semester of study will be those applying in 2010. For the first semester of 2011, the fees you pay will be those approved for the 2011 academic year.

Tuition fees for students who commenced their course in 2004 or earlier

International fee students who commenced their course in 2004 or earlier are able to complete their study under the fee policy that applied at the time they commenced their course (known as 'grandfathering'). However, in a small number of cases this may be less advantageous for students than the policy that was introduced in 2005.

In light of this, existing international students will be charged the lesser of the fees associated with the 2005 fee policy and the fees calculated in accordance with the policy that was in place at the time of their commencement.

Each semester the fee that would have been charged under the policy in place when they first enrolled and the fee that the student would be charged if they had enrolled after the introduction of the new policy (1 January 2005) will be calculated. The student will be charged the lesser of the two amounts.

If a student commenced their course prior to 2004 and remains on the grandfathered (original) fee policy this policy will apply only for:

- undergraduate courses: the standard duration of the course as defined when the student commenced the course plus a further year; or
- graduate courses: twice the normal full-time duration of the course as defined when the student commenced the course.

Any periods of leave of absence or part time enrolment do not extend the above time frames.

If the student takes longer than the above time frames to complete the course they will be required to move to the current fee policy and must pay the fees applicable at that time.

If the student transfers to another course they are subject to the current fee policy and must pay the fees applicable at the time of transfer.

Students whose enrolment is terminated either for poor academic performance, disciplinary grounds or for failure to re-enrol in a timely fashion, if readmitted at any future time, will be required to pay fees according to the fee policy applicable at the time of readmission, not the policy that applied under their original

enrolment. This also applies to students whose enrolment is terminated for unpaid fees or other outstanding debt and who are ineligible for reinstatement.

Tuition fees for students who commenced a graduate course in 2009 or earlier

International fee students who commenced their graduate course in 2009 or earlier will complete their study on a subject fee basis as per the fee policy that applied at the time they commenced their course. Discipline fees for graduate subjects will continue to be set each year and these will apply in the usual manner.

This will apply for as long as the student remains enrolled in the same course. If the student transfers to another course they are subject to the current fee policy and must pay the fees applicable at the time of transfer.

Students whose enrolment is terminated either for poor academic performance, disciplinary grounds or for failure to re-enrol in a timely fashion, if readmitted at any future time, will be required to pay fees according to the fee policy applicable at the time of readmission, not the policy that applied under their original enrolment. This also applies to students whose enrolment is terminated for unpaid fees or other outstanding debt and who are ineligible for reinstatement.

Tuition fee discount for University of Melbourne staff and their families

The University of Melbourne offers staff and their immediate families a 25 per cent discount on the tuition fees for graduate courses and Community Access Program subjects (see column at right for information about the Community Access Program).

Study Abroad and Exchange Program fees

Exchange Program

The cost of participating in the Exchange Program should be covered by the agreement between your home institution and the University of Melbourne.

Study Abroad program

Students participating in the Study Abroad program will be required to pay a course fee to the University of Melbourne. Study Abroad students pay a set tuition fee for their program, irrespective of the number of subjects in which they are enrolled.

ARRANGEMENTS RELATING TO THE PAYMENT OF FEES

Payment options in 2010

When you enrol, you will be asked to select one of three instalment options for payment of your tuition fees:

1. Standard instalment option – one payment for the semester or study period cost (This is the default option)
2. Dual instalment option – the semester or study period cost is halved and payable in 2 equal instalments
3. Yearly instalment option – one payment for the cost of the full year in advance. This option attracts a \$200.00 rebate.

Payment of instalments is required by the due date listed on your invoice (or if you enrol after the due date, within 7 days of enrolment).

Year-long subjects

The full subject cost is incurred and payable in semester 1. If you only enrol in year-long subjects you may wish to consider the following two instalment options:

- yearly instalment - (one payment made in semester 1 for the full cost of the year in advance); or
- dual instalment (two payments made in semester 1).

You normally use the same instalment option throughout a calendar year and can change your instalment option at the commencement of each new year.

The dual instalment option is not available for:

- summer semester;
- non-standard semesters;
- Community Access Program enrolments;
- Study Abroad enrolments.

All instalment options require at least one payment in advance of the commencement of classes. If your circumstances change significantly in a given year, you may contact SMS-Enrolments to request a different instalment option

Due dates for payment

The due date for payment of your tuition fee instalments will be displayed on your invoice available via the Student Portal.

Invoices

Commencing students

The University will send you notice of fees due with your letter of offer. You must pay this fee by the date stated in the letter of offer to confirm your acceptance. If your offer is conditional upon meeting certain entry conditions, such as a specific English language score, then the University will not accept your fee payment until it has proof that all of the conditions stated in your letter of offer have been met.

Graduate

For graduate students the amount owing will be the 2010 per EFTSL course fee (as listed on pages 8-12). You must make a minimum deposit payment of AUD\$10,000 to confirm acceptance of your offer. Once you have arrived and selected your study load as part of enrolment, adjustments may need to be made that require you to pay an additional amount. These will be based on your payment option and your actual enrolment. On enrolment, you may therefore be required to pay an additional amount or your

deposit may have exceeded the amount required to cover your first payment. Any overpayment will be available for refund or can be left to credit future fee instalments.

Undergraduate

For undergraduate students, since, at this stage, you have not chosen the subjects you wish to study, this invoice will state the 2010 typical course fee. You must make a minimum deposit payment of AUD\$10,000 to confirm acceptance of your offer. Once you have arrived and selected your subjects as part of enrolment, adjustments may need to be made that require you to pay an additional amount. These will be based on your payment option and your actual enrolment.

Your actual tuition fee can only be calculated after you have selected your subjects and may differ from the estimated or typical 2010 course fee previously quoted. On enrolment, you may therefore be required to pay an additional amount or you may have your deposit may have exceeded the amount required to cover your first payment. Any overpayment will be available for refund or can be left to credit future fee instalments.

If you have paid an application fee, this payment will be credited toward your first semester's fee account. You will receive an offer either directly from the University or through the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC). In both cases, you must formally accept the offer and pay fees by the stated date.

Continuing students

Your tuition fees will be charged based upon the fee policy in place in the year you commenced your course. The amount you will have to pay will be based upon the course or subjects you have re-enrolled in, your chosen payment option and any monies credited towards your account. Your invoice will be available online, via the Student Portal, prior to each due date.

For students paying by instalments, the due dates for instalments will be available via the Student Portal and advised on the online invoice.

It is your responsibility to ensure payments are made by the date specified on your invoice. If your fees remain unpaid, a late payment fee of \$100 will apply and you will be withdrawn from your subjects in the semester for which payment is outstanding. Withdrawal means that your access to study materials and University facilities will be restricted. Your enrolment in your course will ultimately be cancelled if payment remains outstanding. Your enrolment may also be cancelled if you have other outstanding debts such as library fines. Cancellation means that your enrolment will lapse and you will not be able to use any facilities at the University. You will remain liable for any outstanding debt. The University is required to advise the Department of Immigration and Citizenship of any cancellation of enrolment. This may lead to the cancellation of your student visa.

If your enrolment has been cancelled for non-payment of fees and you wish to be reinstated to your course, you are required to apply for reinstatement to SMS-Enrolments. A reinstatement fee of \$100 will apply, and payment of all outstanding fees will be required before reinstatement. Applications for reinstatement must be made in the same semester in which your enrolment was cancelled.

If you anticipate a problem in meeting a fee payment deadline, please contact SMS-Enrolments well before the deadline to discuss possible alternative arrangements.

Variations to fees owing

If you change subjects or study load after paying the first instalment for a semester, there may be a variation in your tuition fees owing for that semester. Any additional fees must be paid by the due date indicated on your online invoice. Any amount owing to you will be credited towards your next fee instalment or can be refunded on lodgement of a refund request. You should check your invoice via the Student Portal after changing subjects to verify if any additional fees are due or have been credited.

Refunds

If you withdraw from one or more subjects (including course discontinuation or leave of absence) the University will refund some or all of the tuition fees you have paid in advance if you give timely, formal notice.

Notice given of subject withdrawal	Refund
By close of business on the census date* for the subject	A full refund of all the fees you have paid in advance for that subject. For international students in their first year of enrolment, any overseas representative's fee that has been paid (normally 10 per cent of the annual tuition fees for the course accepted by the student) will not be refunded. The maximum deduction will be \$250.
After the census date* for the subject	No refund will be given for subjects with census dates that have passed.

* The census dates for standard semester 1 and semester 2 subjects are 31 March and 31 August respectively. Census dates for other teaching periods may vary. Census dates for the subjects in which you are enrolled are detailed on your Enrolment Record and the census date for every subject offered by the University is published in the Subject Fee Calculator at <http://fee.acs.unimelb.edu.au/>. If a census date is not a working day, then you must complete your subject withdrawal by the last working day before the census date.

The University will refund all the tuition fees you have paid in advance for one of the following reasons:

- The University withdraws an offer of a place. However:
 - If your offer is withdrawn because the information you gave to the University was incorrect or incomplete, in the case of an international student in their first year, the University has the right to retain any overseas representative's fee that has been paid.
 - The University reserves the right to retain up to 10 per cent of tuition fees as well as any overseas representative's fee that has been paid where an offer is withdrawn in circumstances where the Academic Registrar is satisfied that the offer was made on the basis of fraudulent documentation.
- The University is unable to provide the course or the degree that was offered to you.

In the unlikely event that the University of Melbourne is unable to deliver your course in full, you will be offered a refund of all the course money you have paid to date. The refund will be paid to you within two weeks of the day on which the course ceased being provided.

Alternatively, you may be offered enrolment in an alternative course by the University of Melbourne at no extra cost to you. You have the right to choose whether you would prefer a full

- refund of course fees, or to accept a place in another course. If you choose placement in another course, we will ask you to sign a document to indicate that you accept the placement.
- The Australian Government authorities refuse to grant you a student visa.
 - The University does not allow you to continue your course or your degree because you are not making satisfactory academic progress, but you have already paid your tuition fees in advance before you knew about the University's decision. You will not be refunded any tuition fees already paid for the semester in which the suspension occurred.

Refund if University at fault

You will receive a full refund of all tuition fees you have paid in the following circumstances (except where you have already withdrawn):

University default event	Refund entitlement
The course you have enrolled in does not start on the agreed starting date.	Full refund of tuition fees payable within 2 weeks of the agreed starting date.
The course you are enrolled in ceases to be provided by the University at any time after it starts but before it is completed.	Full refund of tuition fees payable within 2 weeks of the date on which the course ceased to be provided.
The course is not provided to you in full because the University has a sanction imposed by a government regulator.	Full refund of tuition fees payable within 2 weeks of the date on which the course ceases to be provided.

Refund if student at fault

You may not be entitled to a full refund of tuition fees if any of the following circumstances apply to you:

Student default event	Refund entitlement
You fail to enrol to start the course on the agreed starting date and have not previously withdrawn or deferred.	You will be refunded any course fees paid before the agreed starting day of the course (the default day) after we deduct at our discretion: (a) the lesser of: (i) an amount equal to 5 per cent of the total amount of course money received before the default day; and (ii) \$250; and (b) any other amounts which the University is entitled to deduct under clause 29 of the Education Services For Overseas Students Act 2000. The University will provide you with a statement which sets out and explains the amounts that have been deducted.
The University refuses to provide or continue to provide the course to you because you failed to pay an amount owing to the University in order to undertake the course.	You will be entitled to a refund if the reason for the default is that you were refused a student visa. In which case, the University will refund any course fees you have paid before the date on which the University refuses to provide or continue to provide the course to you (the default day) after we deduct at our discretion: (a) the lesser of: (i) an amount equal to 5 per cent of the total amount of course money received before the default day; and (ii) \$250; (b) the proportion of course money received before the default day that is equal to the proportion of the course that has been provided to you; and (c) any other amounts which the University is entitled to deduct under clause 29 of the <i>Education Services For Overseas Students Act 2000</i> . The University will provide you with a statement which sets out and explains the amounts that have been deducted.
The University refuses to provide or continue to provide the course to you because you breached a condition of your visa.	You will not be refunded any tuition fees already paid for the semester in which you breached the condition of your visa or for previous semesters undertaken.
The University refuses to provide or continue to provide the course to you because you have been found to have engaged in misconduct (whether general or academic misconduct) and the University has suspended or terminated your enrolment.	You will not be refunded any tuition fees already paid for the semester in which the suspension or termination has occurred or for previous semesters undertaken.

Applying for a refund

If you change your enrolment any monies owed to you will automatically be credited to your account and will be applied towards any future fees. If you prefer a refund, applications can be obtained from <http://studentadmin.unimelb.custhelp.com> (search 'refund') or from your Student Centre.

Refunds should be applied for within 12 months of withdrawal. If you intend to change your enrolment, to be eligible for a refund, you will need to notify the relevant area before the subject census date:

- International Admissions (commencing international students);
- the faculty administering your course (all other students).

Payment of refunds

Before you can be paid a refund:

- the University must have received the money that is to be refunded and must have entered this money into its accounts, that is, cheques cleared, telegraphic transfers received etc.;
- you must repay/settle any other debts owing to the University, such as library fines, student loans; and
- your course or subject cancellation must have been processed.

Refunds:

- will be paid only to you, the person you nominate, or to the sponsoring agency paying fees on your behalf;
- will be paid by cheque or Electronic Funds Transfer;
- will be provided in Australian dollars as an international bank draft to your overseas address or as a telegraphic transfer (foreign currency can be arranged on request);
- will be paid within 15 working days of receipt of your application.

US Federal Family Education Loan Program

The University reserves the right to retain tuition fees paid by recipients of US FFELP funds who withdraw at any stage of the year and any unearned funds must be returned directly to the student's US lender. Any portion of the tuition fees paid which is not required to be returned to the student's US lender will be refunded to the student.

International students granted Australian permanent residency

If you have been granted Australian permanent residency (as notified by the date stamped on your passport) before the start of your first semester or before you are fully enrolled (confirmed status), whichever is the earlier, you must advise the University's General Manager, International Admissions immediately. Your application will be reassessed to determine if you are eligible to receive a Commonwealth supported place. If you have achieved the competitive academic standard for a Commonwealth supported place and there are Commonwealth supported places still available in the course you will receive an offer for a Commonwealth supported place. If you do not satisfy the entry criteria for a Commonwealth supported place and/or there are no Commonwealth supported places remaining you will be unable to enrol at the University at that time. Australian Government requirements do not permit you to enrol as an international student under these circumstances.

If you have been granted Australian permanent residency (as notified by the date stamped on your passport) after enrolling in

an international fee place you must immediately contact SMS-Enrolments and present your passport. You are not permitted to stay enrolled as an international student once you have become an Australian permanent resident, according to Australian Government regulations. Your enrolment will be converted to an Australian fee place in the same course, where available.

If your enrolment is converted to an Australian fee place, the tuition fee will be as for all students commencing in the course in the year of the transfer.

Students in coursework courses will also be eligible to apply for a Commonwealth supported place where available. Applications for Commonwealth supported places must be made in writing to the Manager of the Student Centre administering your course, and must be made before the subject census date. Your application for a Commonwealth supported place will be considered along with all other transfer or lateral entry applicants. Selection into any available places will be determined on academic merit. If you are not successful in gaining a Commonwealth supported place at that time, you can re-apply for a Commonwealth supported place for the following semester. Admission to Commonwealth supported places is highly competitive and a transfer may not be possible.

Graduate research students who gain Australian permanent residency may be eligible for their course enrolment to be funded under the Commonwealth government's Research Training Scheme in subsequent semesters. Once you have presented your passport showing your Australian permanent resident status, your enrolment will be converted to a Research Training Scheme place, where available.

Fees and refunds

If your enrolment is converted from an international fee place to an Australian fee place or Commonwealth supported place, any changes to enrolment and fees will take effect from the first census date following the date permanent residency was granted. If your tuition fees are less than the amount you have paid for that and any subsequent semester, the difference will be credited to your account. For international students in their first year of enrolment, any overseas representatives fee that has been paid (normally 10 per cent of the annual tuition fee for the course accepted by the student) will not be deducted. The minimum deduction will be \$250. Should your tuition fees be higher you will be issued an invoice for the difference.

If you are granted Australian permanent residency during a semester but after your final subject census date in that semester, the international fee will continue to apply for that semester. Your new fee structure will apply from the following semester.

Special provisions for graduate completions

Adjustments after the submission of a thesis by graduate research students

Tuition fees will always be charged in advance. If you intend to submit a thesis before the end of a semester, you will be entitled to a refund depending on the date of submission. Once you submit your thesis a refund of fees will be calculated on a daily pro-rata basis.

Extension of research candidature

If you are a graduate research student who has been granted an extension of your candidature, you will continue to be charged fees for the next full payment period.

Example

Javier is an international fee student enrolled in a Master of Women's Health (by Research) in 2009. He commences semester 2 on 1 July and is undertaking a normal workload of 0.5 EFTSL. Javier's semester 2 tuition fee is calculated as:

$$\$32,150 \times 0.5 = \$16,075$$

He submits his thesis on 13 September (before the end of semester). He will be charged only from 1 July to 12 September (74 days). Thus his actual tuition fees are calculated as:

$$\$32,150 \times 0.5 \times 74/184 = \$6,465$$

He is entitled to a refund of \$9,610 (\$16,075 – \$6,465)

Late submissions of a minor thesis by graduate coursework students

If a minor thesis is part of your work requirement for a given semester, you should submit this before the start of the next semester. If you are not able to do this then you must re-enrol in the same subject for the next semester and pay the tuition fees for this subject again. If you have completed the thesis and submitted it prior to the course census date you can apply for a refund. If you do not complete and submit the thesis prior to the census date you are not eligible for a refund of fees.

Policy amendments

Goods and Services Tax (GST) does not currently apply to tuition fees. Should this change, the University reserves the right to charge GST in addition to the published fee.

The University reserves the right to amend this policy as required. Any changes will be notified in writing.
